Dear Brothers and Sisters of Saint John the Baptist Parish Family Dear Friends of our Parish,

Wishes for a very happy, healthy and blessed Easter to you and all your loved ones! I am so grateful to our loving God that we can celebrate Easter 2024 together and once again be with our Risen Lord who is the source of life and every blessing. In Him, our Redeemer, we find during these blessed days the reassurance that in every moment of our lives His redeeming and loving presence is with us and that one day we will share in the fullness of His joy, peace and glory in eternity.

The Gospel story of this Easter Sunday (cf. John 20:1-9) provides for us a precise narrative of what happened on the day of the "very first Easter," the morning of the Lord's resurrection. We hear about Mary of Magdala, Simon Peter and John, that other disciple whom Jesus loved, arriving at the empty tomb of the Savior. Together with them we are drawn to the countless perplexities of that spectacular moment, as well as to so many sorrows of the days which preceded this triumphant discovery. Right there, by the empty tomb of their friend Jesus, their hopes confront their disappointments, their joys begin to heal their sorrows, and their faith, little by little, scatters the darkness of their disbelief. Saint John is very honest in describing this internal transformation in the very last part of the Gospel story as he tells us that they witnessed what had happened but not yet fully understood. He needed to share this important detail so their stories of faith, as later described by him and three other Evangelists, may continue to unravel and be always deepened, not through their own efforts and merits, but through the graces and blessings of their friend and Risen Lord.

As we, dear brothers and sisters, as a community of faith gather symbolically around the empty tomb of our Savior and witness together His triumphant resurrection, there is, truly, a piece of Mary of Magdala, Peter, John, other disciples and followers of the Lord in each and every one of us. Here, by His empty tomb, our own hopes confront our disappointments, our joys begin to heal our sorrows, and our faith, little by little, scatters the darkness of our disbelief.

Thank you for being those disciples of the Lord who once again this year proclaim and celebrate our faith in the Risen Lord and our personal resurrection with Him. May the Mother of Jesus and our own Heavenly Mother, Blessed Virgin Mary, Saint Joseph, Saint John the Baptist and all the Saints of Heaven continue to accompany us and intercede for all of us on our own personal journeys of faith.

Our Logo, as a Description of our Journey

- Register Renew Grow are the three words which describe the journey of our parish family through this important initiative, and our desire for an ongoing renewal and dynamic growth, welcoming new members of this special community of faith, and serving with love, dedication and joy to all members of our community.
- The Risen Christ among his disciples and friends is painted on the western wall of our church's entrance area. This beautiful rendition of the Lord's constant presence in the community of the Early Church was "donated to us," by the previous generations of our parishioners, especially those who sacrificed and built St. John the Baptist Church, as a reminder and affirmation of Christ dwelling in our parish family. As he did throughout his numerous revelations to his disciples and friends following the Resurrection, even in our own times Jesus continually reassures us of his constant presence among us. He also sends us to go into our contemporary world in his name, to bring those precious gifts of faith, hope, and love to others, as his gifts.
- A new branch and leaves growing out of W in the word RENEW is a symbol of our community's desire to grow, prosper, and constantly renew itself through our fidelity to the Gospel, trust in God, love of others, dedication to our community, as well as our willingness to sacrifice for our parish. That new branch and those new leaves are also our tribute to all our new parishioners, those who have recently joined us on our journeys of Christian discipleship, as well as those who will become members of our community in the future.
- The arrow in W in the word GROW is a symbol of spiritual and personal growth which our community wants to bring about in the lives of all its members. It is also a symbol of our welcoming spirit and the desire to welcome, embrace and accompany all new brothers and sisters who desire to join our community. As the arrow points "higher," it is a symbol of our reliance on God's presence, protection, and guidance. By pointing toward the new leaves, it gives testimony to our common desire for growth as our constant priority, and by its bent shape our recognition that we are willing to overcome, with God's help, various challenges on our personal journey.

What is Next? OUR PHASE 1

Holy Thursday, March 28, 2024 —> Pentecost, May 19, 2024

- A) On Holy Thursday 2024, also in honor of that very special day when Jesus gathered his Apostles and gave them the great gift of the Eucharist, his very Body and Blood, and instructed them to gather, celebrate, grow and do this always "in remembrance of me", we launched our Register Renew Grow parish journey of updating all our parishioners' data and contact information, in the process of our parish's renewal and growth. Our secure website renew.stjohnhillsdale.org contains a renewal and registration form which is very easy to complete, and it should take no more than 5 minutes of your time. For those who would rather fill out a paper renewal and registration form, those will be provided throughout this entire process in our church's entrance and exit areas.
- B) In a parallel process, we will reach out, via a personal letter to all our parishioners who have not been active in our parish during the past two years, who continue to receive, at our parish's expense, donation envelopes and who have not made any (even \$1) contribution to the parish community during these past two years. Through our internal review, we have identified a very large number of registered individual parishioners and families who are in this category. They will all be very kindly asked to reconsider their relationship and commitment to our parish.

The parish is not an outdated institution; precisely because it possesses great flexibility, it can assume quite different contours depending on the openness and missionary creativity of the pastor and the community. While certainly not the only institution which evangelizes, if the parish proves capable of self-renewal and constant adaptivity, it continues to be "the Church living in the midst of the homes of her sons and daughters". This presumes that it really is in contact with the homes and the lives of its people and does not become a useless structure out of touch with people or a self-absorbed group made up of a chosen few. The parish is the presence of the Church in a given territory, an environment for hearing God's word, for growth in the Christian life, for dialogue, proclamation, charitable outreach, worship and celebration. In all its activities the parish encourages and trains its members to be evangelizers. It is a community of communities, a sanctuary where the thirsty come to drink in the midst of their journey, and a center of constant missionary outreach."

The Sisters of St. Joseph of Chestnut Hill were placed in charge of the school's daily operations. The student population increased rapidly.

CHRIST THROUGH HIS DEATH AND RESURRECTION GIFTED US A FUNDAMENTAL RIGHT: THE RIGHT TO HOPE



[...] At dawn the women went to the tomb. There the angel says to them: "Do not be afraid. He is not here; for he has risen". They hear the words of life even as they stand before a tomb... And then they meet Jesus, the giver of all hope, who confirms the message and says: "Do not be afraid". Do not be afraid, do not yield to fear: This is the message of hope. It is addressed to us, today. These are the words that God repeats to us this very night.

Today we acquire a fundamental right that can never be taken away from us: the right to hope. It is a new and living hope that comes from God. It is not mere optimism; it is not a pat on the back or an empty word of encouragement, uttered with an empty smile. No! It is a gift from heaven, which we could not have earned on our own. Over these weeks, we have kept repeating, "All will be well", clinging to the beauty of our humanity and allowing words of encouragement to rise up from our hearts. But as the days go by and fears grow, even the boldest hope can dissipate. Jesus' hope is different. He plants in our hearts the conviction that God is able to make everything work unto good, because even from the grave he brings life.

The grave is the place where no one who enters ever leaves. But Jesus emerged for us; he rose for us, to bring life where there was death, to begin a new story in the very place where a stone had been placed. He, who rolled away the stone that sealed the entrance of the tomb, can also remove the stones in our hearts. So, let us not give in to resignation; let us not place a stone before hope. We can and must hope, because God is faithful. He did not abandon us; he visited us and entered into our situations of pain, anguish and death. His light dispelled the darkness of the tomb: today he wants that light to penetrate even to the darkest corners of our lives.

This is the Easter message, a message of hope. It contains a second part, the sending forth. "Go and tell my brethren to go to Galilee" (Mt 28:10), Jesus says. "He is going before you to Galilee", the angel says. The Lord goes before us; he goes before us always. It is encouraging to know that he walks ahead of us in life and in death; he goes before us to Galilee, that is, to the place which for him and his disciples evoked the idea of daily life, family and work. Jesus wants us to bring hope there, to our everyday life. [...] Returning to Galilee means remembering that we have been loved and called by God. This is always the point from which we can set out anew, especially in times of crisis and trial, remembering always our Galilee.
